Ecological Inter/Dependencies: Strong Asymmetrical Relations and More-than-Human Worlds

This workshop seeks to synthesize perspectives from the environmental humanities with the study of strong asymmetrical dependencies across histories, geographies and cultures. Ecological issues concerning climate change, pollution, extraction logics, unequal land ownership or multispecies relationships intersect with and prompt us to rethink questions of power, difference and dependency.

Bringing together the BCDSS's different focal points within the humanities and social sciences (and thus combining anthropological, historical, literary, archaeological, ethnographic and technological perspectives), this workshop's focus on ecological inter/dependencies offers a valuable critical perspective on the cluster's research on strong asymmetrical dependencies. By foregrounding relationships beyond the human to include animals, ecosystems, landscapes, organisms and resources, the workshop aims to connect researchers across disciplines and to sharpen our approach to the study of dependency.
